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EMP 7081: Ethics in Energy Medicine (3 Credits)

Overview of Course:

This course explores personal, professional, medical, CAM, genetic, legal, technological, social, economic, political, metaphysical, and spiritual ethics, and personal and professional values and ethical foundations.

Course Topics:

Topics include personal, professional, medical, CAM, genetic, legal, technological, social, economic, political, metaphysical, and spiritual ethics, and personal and professional values and ethical foundations.

Learning Objectives:

After completing this course participants will have gained a deeper understanding of ethics.

Audience:

Open to all students in the EMU Distance program.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores ethics: personal and professional ethics, ethics in medicine, CAM, and genetics, and legal, technological, social, economic, political, metaphysical, and spiritual ethics. Topics include personal and professional values and ethical foundations.

NEED STATEMENT

Students will:

- 1) Develop an in-depth awareness of ethics.
- 2) Be able to utilize the knowledge they have gained regarding ethics to extend their own research and therapeutic methods, and in their profession.
- 3) Develop the skills needed to identify essential factors pertaining to ethics.
- 4) Be able to assist others using the understanding of ethics they have gained.
- 5) Develop the critical skills needed to apply their understanding of ethics knowledgeably.

FACULTY-STUDENT COMMUNICATION

• Telephone Contact:

Students should arrange all telephone communications with the instructor by email beforehand. An initial phone contact to clarify course objectives and develop a schedule should be made prior to beginning the course. This contact should be scheduled within the first few weeks of commencement of the semester. After this, periodic telephone communication can be arranged with instructor. The instructor may be able to set up one-on-one discussions with the student using Skype. Students should check email frequently for professor and EMU messages.

COURSE DELIVERY STYLE

Distance Education - Coursework is completed at a location determined by the student utilizing a computer that has the ability to play audio and video clips, with Microsoft Office Word, Excel, PowerPoint, Adobe Reader, along with a current web browser, internet connection and email address. Contact and communication with distance students is typically conducted by telephone, Internet, Skype, text chat, and email. Students are also encouraged to contact the University by facsimiles, and postal mail, and by personal visit to the University.

2) Course Paper/Project

Students will prepare a scholarly paper of approximately 10 double-spaced, typewritten pages, 12 point, Times Roman Font, using the APA Style Manual. Papers focus upon a specific aspect of the course. Students may elect to do a graduate level research project.

3) Course Review

Students are given a set of assignments, readings, and explorations in preparation for a course review of the materials. Students schedule the time and date for the face-to-face, telephone or Skype conference with the instructor.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Assignment 1. Research, Reflection, Practicum, Dialogue

Participants will begin to research, explore, and reflect on ethics. After completing the reading and practicum, participants will share their reflections in writing and dialogue. Throughout the course, readings and assignments may be tailored to the participants.

Assignment 2. Selected Reading, Reflection, Practicum, Dialogue

Participants will research, explore, and reflect on personal, professional, medical, CAM, genetic, legal, technological, social, economic, political, metaphysical, and spiritual ethics. After completing the readings, media selections, and practicums, they will share their reflections in writing and dialogue.

Assignment 3. Final Paper or Project

Students have the option of preparing a scholarly paper of approximately 10 double-spaced typewritten pages using the appropriate style manual or designing a research project. Scholarly papers and research projects will focus upon a specific aspect of the course. Research projects will be evaluated based on content, originality, the use of source material, and documentation. Scholarly papers will be evaluated based on content, originality, source material, grammar, and spelling.

Assignment 4. Course Review

The Course Review will be given by telephone (or other means) and will cover the assignments. Students will negotiate the timing of the review.

INDIVIDUALIZATION OF STUDENT ASSIGNMENTS

Each student will be afforded the opportunity of writing on a subject that is related to his or her field of interest. This will assist the student in making each paper individualized. Also the student is encouraged to go outside the field and obtain research data from other interdisciplinary areas. Each student, based on his or her background, will be encouraged to transfer that theoretical information which the course provides into a practical format in the final paper or project.

COURSE EVALUATION AND GRADING DETERMINANTS

The course grade will be based upon student participation, the promptness of postings, the satisfactory completion of all coursework, the quality of the research paper or project, and the course review.
